This year Tannersville received the highly coveted Downtown Revitalization Initiative (DRI) Award. This award is something we have been working on since 2018 in collaboration with our partners at the Village of Tannersville. For a community as small as ours to receive it, truly was historic. We ARE officially the smallest community to ever apply for and then receive this ten million dollar direct investment, and we will make sure that it leads to transformational projects that will benefit our area for generations. Keep in mind that while this funding is a direct investment within the borders of the Village of Tannersville, that the positive impacts of this investment in our rural area will be felt across our entire region.

Affordable workforce housing, new and improved tourist based amenities, assistance for our Main Street businesses and properties are just some of the great projects that we will be moving forward with. The Hunter Foundation also acquired the Philadelphia Hill Church this year. If you are not familiar with it, this is a historic church on the edge of the Village, set in an idyllic location surrounded by the forest. We will be utilizing the church this coming year as a venue for small musical events and other special events for the community. We are very excited for you all to visit and hear the amazing acoustics in person.

Our core businesses, Colonial Golf Course, Fromer Market Gardens, and Tannersville Antique Store all had prosperous years, acting as community centers where people gather and spend time, while supporting the efforts of our organization. I want to thank all of our Managers and Hunter Foundation Staff for the incredible work that you performed this year. We could not have done any of this without you.

I want to also thank our supporters for all that you have given us this year, through your contributions, your letters of encouragement and your support of our community. MISSION, VISION, & GOALS

The Hunter Foundation serves the Village of Tannersville, and surrounding area of Hunter, by working with area businesses, individuals, and not-for-profits to develop a sense of place and community through "Main Street" revitalization, residential assistance, and creative planning.



- Support a thriving locally-owned business economy.
- Support community development activities that reinforce the mountaintop as a four-season recreation & vacation community, creating a unique sense of place that sustains the beauty and character of the Town.
- Provide housing solutions that enable residents to live in a safe and affordable community.
- Provide support to communities and organizations in the Town of Hunter and throughout the Mountaintop.
- Build a cooperative community and strengthen its identity as a creative place with all desired community services.

ORGANIZATION SNAPSHOT

Covering the mountaintop towns of Ashland, Halcott, Hunter, Jewett, Lexington, Prattsville, and Windham, we have to date renovated more than 100 homes and 35 businesses. Since our founding in 1997, we have seen our local economy expanded by over \$12 million dollars. We give local preference in bidded contracts to local contractors, ensuring that work stays within the community.

From the time I began teaching, through my transition to principal and superintendent, one support group stands out, The Hunter Foundation. The Foundation and the District support each other and collaborate to best offer opportunities to our community through our student body. JOB CREATED & SUPPORTED

In 2021, the Hunter Foundation **employed 20 year round, full time and part time employees** at Fromer Market Gardens, Tannersville Antiques, and Colonial Country Club.



HOUSING & COMMERCIAL SUPPORT

In 2021, the Hunter Foundation provided affordable housing to 40 people in 18 different residences in the Village of Tannersville. Acknowledging the housing crisis in the area, we moved our AirBnB's to year-round long term rentals to provide housing to individuals and families who work on the mountaintop.

We also work with 13 different businesses along 23A Main Street by providing them affordable commercial space to rent under annual or long term contracts.

GRANT AWARD - 2020 CFA FMG FARM HUB



Empire State Development (ESD) granted the Hunter Foundation \$50,000 (half of a \$100,000 project budget to be matched by the Foundation) to conduct a strategic planning and feasibility study to evaluate the feasibility and market potential of unifying community elements to create a Culinary Food Hub, the core concept of which would be a commercial kitchen incubator on the farm's premises.

At the project's initiation, the components of a Culinary Hub were loosely defined, and included elements such as a commercial culinary incubator, cooking classes and other educational activities that would primarily take place in the

historic farmhouse on Fromer Market Gardens' property, both of which would require substantial renovation and likely expansion to accommodate such uses.

As our research moved forward, there was concern that the significant renovation—including building an addition to the farmhouse—would minimally be required to accommodate an incubator of a size that would, as a business, be feasible from a cost-benefit perspective. Deeper evaluation of the overall property and its location raised concerns about accessibility, parking, and additional utilities (electricity, gas, water/sewer) that would be required for the building to function as a commercial food production facility.

The community engagement strategy comprised both virtual and in-person components including 14 hour long stakeholder interviews, a web-based survey that fielded over 300 responses, and 40 attendees who attended four in-person, on-farm community workshops.

As feedback was collected, data yielded little direct interest in the use of a commercial-scale incubator and processing kitchen among potential tenants, clients and/or value-added producers, and it is unclear how much demand for such a space exists on the mountaintop. In light of this, combined with the results from interviews, surveys, and community engagement events, the concept explored—and presented for further development here—evolved from "Culinary Hub" to "Farm Hub."





WHAT WE LEARNED - **RECOMMENDATIONS**

Develop FMG into Community Anchor & Farm Hub

- Evaluate staffing plan
- Create & executive an outreach and communications plan
- Formalize partnerships with missionaligned organizations across the region
- Develop a data-gathering platform to build knowledge, network, and understand farm and food economy capacity for the region

Carefully Increase Food Production and Sales

- Assess capacity to increase output from existing footprint
- Identify more partners to augment FMG's farm stand offerings
- Build a small commercial kitchen within existing Farm Main House garage
- Consider long term strategies to spearhead a mountaintop farm incubator

Develop Education for Youth, Young Adults. & Job Seekers

- Develop curricula and apprenticeship programs in collaboration with educational partners
- Coordinate with institutional partners to create curricula, job training, and apprenticeships for adults already in workforce
- Engage HTC student body and other youth directly to determine their priorities and interests

GRANT AWARD - 2021 REDC DRI AWARDS


On November 28, 2021, Governor Kathy Hochul announced the 2021 Capital Region Downtown Revitalization Initiative (DRI) Grant to the Village of Tannersville. Lieutenant Governor Brian Benjamin was in Tannersville to announce the award. The annual \$10 million award is "a cornerstone of the State's economic development program, transforms downtown neighborhoods into vibrant centers that offer a high quality of life and are magnets for redevelopment, business, job creation, and economic and housing diversity."

Led by the Hunter Foundation, the Painted Village in the Sky DRI Proposal encompasses 14 projects with a total value of over \$66 million, leveraging up to \$43 million of private and philanthropic dollars. According to the proposal, DRI projects would more than double the Village's job base and once all projects are at full employment would create \$16.5 million in additional economic output annually. Together the Hunter Foundation. The Royce Family Fund, and the Village of Tannersville have proven their deep commitment and skilled leverage of philanthropic dollars to support projects in the region.

FROMER MARKET GARDENS

FMG had another incredible year despite the lingering effects of the COVID pandemic. Farm Manager, Sam Metz had a successful first full season as manager with the help of her amazing farm crew. We added two new hard working members to the crew this year, Tannersville locals, Katlyn Wood and Evan Paradis! Alongside experienced farmers Jake Covey and Arnaud Ossi-Dissais, the crew did an excellent job of keeping the farm running and providing the community fresh, organic produce all year long.

In September, we added some more really special team members- 30 laying hens! The chickens have been working hard to give you the most beautiful eggs in town! They live in a local-made chicken palace in the back of the farm and their eggs are sold at the farm stand and local restaurants. They are a great addition to the farm and we are excited to show them off more this coming summer season. You might even see a couple chicken ambassadors down at the farm stand!

Throughout the summer, FMG worked closely with local restaurants including Jessie's Harvest House, Deer Mountain Inn, The Tin Cup, and many more. We are grateful for all of their support and love working with our local businesses. We also donated lots of produce to the local Food Pantry to ensure that fresh veggies were accessible to those in need.

The farm team is hoping to do more community outreach and increase the number of events this coming 2022 summer season. With the help of local businesses, including the Mountain Top Library, we plan to have more farmers markets, farm tours, workshops, and private events on the farm! We also hope to have more activities and engagement with the kids at HTC right next door!

COLONIAL COUNTRY CLUB

Colonial Country Club marked the 2021 year with tremendous growth and impeccable weather. Our busiest season yet offered two sold out Night Golf events during the season, a summer Kids Golf Camp, league play, regional women's league outings, and a mountaintop battle between Colonial vs. Christman's Windham members.

Mother nature helped keep the greens green and the groundskeepers worked tirelessly to keep the course in the best shape of its existence. With close to 140 members - highest in history - the course saw play almost every day, even with the occasional drizzle.

Colonial also provided the perfect backdrop and host to our live summer concert series, the Hunter Foundation's Annual Summer Fundraiser, and for the first time, HTC Theater's fall production of Frozen Jr.

With the leadership of Ernie Reale, the *Back 9* saw over two miles of new mountain bike trails expand - **Colonial Loop and Trail System** - and connect to the Tannersville Bike Path, further growing and connecting our accessible trails across the Village.

PROGRAMS: MENTAL HEALTH PARTNERSHIPS

In response to the growing mental health crisis across the mountaintop, the Hunter Foundation partnered with the Live Like Legg Foundation and the Mountain Top Library to offer a Youth Mental Health First Aid Certification which included activities, videos, and hands-on responder training in emerging crisis situations in the mental health of our youth. Participants also were introduced to the Mental Health First Aid Action Plan, a memorable, practiced, step by step way to provide that initial help in any mental health emergency.

The first seminar sold out with 28 participants from the HTC Elementary and High School including teachers and staff.

The course was provided by Abeda Khanam, mountaintop resident, chaplain, educator, and mental health advocate. Each participant received a certification of complettion from the USA Mental Health First Aid National Council.

The Hunter Foundation will continue to partner with the Live Like Legg Foundation in offering these initial programs and certifications for the general public, students, and first responders well into 2022.

PROGRAMS: PAINT PROJECT

Our cornerstone Paint Project continued this year, completing two residential properties along 23A Main Street.

The Paint Project is underwritten by Board Chair Emeritus, Elena Patterson and her family. In its programs history, the Paint Project has repainted and renovated the Main Street facades of over 30 properites.

In 2021, the Paint Project completed Orvet at 6073 Main Street and a residential home at 5920 Main Street.

Property owners were thrilled with the upgraded facade and the colors really added to our *Painted Village in the Sky* theme.

The Hunter Foundation typically picks 1-2 projects a year and bids it out to local contractors, keeping our local workforce engaged and the dollars in our community.

This year the Hunter Foundation partnered with the HTC Theatre Program and Onteora Park Theater to provide two great theatrical musicals to the public.

Frozen Jr was the first outdoor theater event in HTC history and performed to three sold out crowds at Colonial Country Club. All proceeds went to the HTC Theater Program.

Shannon Hoyt (director) partnered with Amy Scheibe to produce the first annual live stage production of Rocky Horror Picture Show that combined high school, local, and professional talent and raised over \$5,000 for the Hunter Foundation's general fund.
